COLUMBUS REGIONAL HEALTH

Bartholomew County Health Department Prevention, education, and preparedness for our community's health







Children's Dental Health Program – Emphasizes good oral hygiene, nutrition, and regular visits to the dentist. Education is provided to requesting community groups, schools and longterm care facilities. Referrals and assistance are also available through this program.

Clinics – Cholesterol, blood pressure, weight, hemoglobin and glucose screenings are offered monthly at predetermined places. Lipid panel and A1C screenings are offered monthly at the Health Department by appointment.

Immunization Program – Provides county residents with immunity against specifi c diseases. Immunizations are administered to infants through adults. Medicaid, underinsured, uninsured and some other insurance accepted. Call for an appointment. Individuals can also be signed up for MyVaxIndiana, which gives access to immunization records anytime and anywhere in the world.

Lead Program – Every child should be tested for lead at 12 and 24 months of age. Lead testing can be completed at the primary physician's office or the Bartholomew County Health Department for no charge. Education on lead poisoning, sources of lead, symptoms of lead poisoning and ways to reduce your child's risk of lead poisoning can also be provided.

Pregnancy Testing and Prenatal Vitamins – Available by appointment at no charge.

Public Health Nursing Program – Provides home visits to our high-risk elderly population who are in need of assistance with medication setup.

Sharps Program – Provides and disposes of sharps containers at no charge to county residents. Residents must provide proof of need via prescription or medication box at initial pickup.


STD/HIV/Hepatitis Program – All potential clients are assessed for individual risk factors. The STD/HIV/Hepatitis program provides testing, diagnosis and treatment. All services are provided by appointment, often at no charge. Condoms are available at the Health Department – Nursing Division upon request.

Tuberculosis - TB skin testing is available to individuals on Mondays from 8 - 11 a.m. and 1 - 4 p.m., available by appointment. Please call for fee. QuantiFERON Gold blood test is also available by appointment and is recommended for foreign-born individuals.

Know Your Status - Anyone who has immunization records from previous years can bring them to the Health Department to have them entered into the registry.





Q: What courts of law are in Bartholomew County?

A: There are three courts in Bartholomew County's justice system: Circuit Court, Superior Court No. 1 and Superior Court No. 2.

• CIRCUIT COURT is under constitutional jurisdiction and handles adult felony cases, criminal cases, adoptions, estates, guardianship, civil collection, mortgage foreclosure, civil torts, civil plenary, paternity action/ dissolution, protective orders and reciprocal cases.

• SUPERIOR COURT NO. 1 is under jurisdiction of the General Assembly. It handles felony cases for Levels 1 through 6 violations; some misdemeanor charges; civil torts aligning with medical malpractice, automobile accidents and property damage; some cases regarding owner or guardianship such as child support, parenting time, divorce, child custody, wills, disputes and trusts; well-being cases such as cases involving adult protective services and protective orders; and all mental health cases and all civil case collections exceeding the six-thousanddollar limit of small claims. The court also oversees the Bartholomew County Veterans Treatment Court, which is a certified problem-solving court specializing in issues surrounding veterans involved with the criminal justice system who suffer from substance abuse and/or mental health issues related to their service.

• SUPERIOR COURT NO. 2 is a general jurisdiction court created by state legislation. It also handles all of Bartholomew County's misdemeanor criminal cases, traffic cases, small claims, ordinance violations, a variety of felony criminal cases and all types of civil cases.

Xenia Miller died in 2008. • Western actor **Ken Maynard**, born in Vevay and raised in Columbus, made dozens of films and serials in the 1920s and '30s. He would often return to the Columbus home of his parents.

- Columbus is the hometown of former NFL quarterbacks **Mike Phipps** and **Blair Kiel**.
- Opera diva **Madame Thea Dorré**, born Effie Critchfield in Jonesville around 1860.
- **Mike Pence**, former Indiana governor who served as the 48th vice president of the United States from 2017 to 2021.



A: SMITH JONES, elected Oct. 24, 1864.

Q: Who is the longest serving mayor in Columbus history?

A: Former Mayor **FRED ARMSTRONG** was in office from 1997-2011 for an unprecedented four terms.

Q: How many other mayors has Columbus had since 1864?

A: Current Mayor JIM LIENHOOP is the 37th person to hold the office of mayor. The first was SMITH D. JONES, elected Oct. 24, 1864, just 20 days after Columbus was incorporated as a city.

Q: Have all Columbus mayors been men?

A: No. NANCY ANN BROWN became the first woman ever elected mayor of Columbus on Nov. 6, 1979, and in 2011, KRISTEN BROWN became the second.

Q: Have any Columbus mayors served two nonconsecutive terms?

- H. KARL VOLLAND, 1914-1918 and 1930-1935.
- FRED C. OWENS, 1940-1943 and 1956-1959.

A: CEREALINE, a hominy-based product sold mainly for use in food preparation and in making beer, but also sold as a breakfast cereal. In 1892 the Cerealine company moved to Indianapolis and changed its name to American Hominy.

Q: What did an acre of land in the county cost in the early 1800s?


A: \$1.25 at the land office.

Q: Who had the only gold watch in the county in 1821?

A: John Lindsey.

Q: How much did it cost Cummins Inc. founder Clessie Cummins to drive his diesel-powered car from Indianapolis to New York in 1930?

A: \$1.38.

Q: When was The Republic first published?

A: The Evening Republic was founded in 1872 by Isaac T. Brown and Frank W. Lantz. Lantz sold his interest a year later, and the paper was owned and operated by the Brown family until 2015 — when it was sold to AIM Media, ending 143 years of local ownership.

Q: What is the oldest tavern in Columbus?

A: The Columbus Bar on Fourth Street, in operation since 1939.

Q: When was the Columbus Symphony Orchestra established?

A: 1922, predating the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra by eight years.

Q: Who were some of the famous people who appeared at

Columbus' Distinguished Visitors Series in the 1970s and '80s?


A: Actors Leonard Nimoy, Patricia Neal and Vincent Price; writers Maya Angelou, Joseph Heller and David Halberstam; journalists Tom Brokaw, David Brinkley and Erma Bombeck; and sports figures Hank Aaron and Bill Russell.

Q: What was the Columbus Municipal Airport property previously known as?

A: Bakalar Air Force Base, which closed in 1970.

Q: How long has Henry Moore's "Large Arch" sculpture graced the plaza in front of Bartholomew County Public Library?

A: The sculpture was dedicated in 1971, three years before Jean Tinguely's "Chaos I" was installed in The Commons.

Q: What has been the hottest day in Columbus' history?

A: That would have been July 24, 1934, when the temperature reached 111 degrees as measured by Lynn A. Barnaby, a longtime florist who took the reading at his greenhouse on Lawton Avenue.

Q: What was the warmest year in Columbus history? Coldest?

A: The warmest year on record was 1938, which was more than 3 degrees above normal. The coldest year on record occurred in 1958 when readings were about 21/2 degrees below normal.

Q: What was the wettest year in Columbus history? The driest?

A: The wettest was 1929, when 57 inches of rain and melted snow fell, nearly 50 percent more than the normal 40 inches. That year included a whopping 8.6 inches in January and 9.10 inches in May. It even included a drier than normal August. The driest year on record is 1934, when just 26.88 inches fell. That year, also one of the warmest on record, included three months when less than an inch of rain fell.

Q: What has been the heaviest snowfall in a single day in Columbus?

A: That's an easy one. It was from the morning of Dec. 22 to Dec. 23, 2004, when 24 to 36 inches fell at various locations in and around Columbus.

Q: Where is Columbus' official weather data recorded?

A: It's at the Columbus Wastewater Treatment Plant on Water Street south of downtown. That's been the official station since June 17, 1953. There, plant operators record temperatures, precipitation and the level of East Fork White River.

Q: What has been the coldest morning in Columbus history?

A: Officially, it's 27 degrees below zero, recorded twice: Jan. 13, 1912, and Feb. 13, 1899, readings taken by John A. Perry. Unofficially, it would be the 42 degrees below zero reading taken on New Year's Day, 1864

Q: What has been the heaviest rainfall in a day in Columbus?

A: That occurred on March 25, 1913, when 7 inches of rain fell in 24 hours. That rain was partly responsible for the worst flood in Indiana weather history, until 2008. Also, official rainfall of 6.51 inches was recorded on July 20, 1998, although unofficial totals of 10 or more inches were recorded in only five hours that day.

Q: What has been the most significant weather-related disaster in Columbus?

A: On June 7, 2008, torrential rains north of the city caused flash flooding of the East Fork of White River and Haw Creek. In a matter of just a few hours flood waters quickly destroyed hundreds of homes and businesses throughout Bartholomew County, killed two people and caused the evacuation and temporary closure of Columbus Regional Hospital. White River crested at 18.9 feet, surpassing the previous record of 17.9 feet set in 1913.

WHAT'S THE **WEATHER?**

There's a popular saying that goes, "If you don't like the weather, wait five minutes." While things really aren't quite that unpredictable, Columbus definitely has four distinct seasons. Over the course of a year, wardrobe requirements will range from shorts and T-shirts to snow boots and parkas.



The average high temperature for the year is 64.6 degrees Fahrenheit, though hot summer days frequently register in the 90s.



The average low temperature is 43.5 degrees. While temperatures below zero are fairly rare, they do occur.

The coldest month is January, with an average low temperature of 21.5 degrees and an average high of 38.6.

Q: Who sets property taxes?

A: Each governmental unit sets its rates. For example, school boards determine rates for school corporations, and the City Council sets the city's rates. Bartholomew County charges a local income tax. Property tax rates are subject to state limits.

Q: What does a tax abatement do?

A: Tax abatements are used to encourage local industries and businesses to invest in new jobs. Companies may apply for abatement of property taxes on new construction or new equipment. Tax abatements must be approved by the Columbus City Council or Bartholomew County Council. Under a tax abatement, companies do not immediately pay property tax on new construction or equipment. Instead, taxes are phased in, usually over a decade. Under a usual tax abatement, a company would, for example, pay taxes on about 50 percent of the property's value after five years. Eventually, the company will pay the entire tax that is due on the new equipment or construction. Since the tax abatement is based on the assessed value of the new equipment or construction, it affects revenues for schools and other governmental units.



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
